During the past decade, the 6-county population increased by slightly more than 180,000 people, an overall increase of 11%. Johnson, Cass, Clay and Platte Counties all had population increases of 21%. Jackson County's population went up 3% and Wyandotte County held steady. The number of people in Johnson County increased on average 9,300 people a year between 2000 and 2010. Johnson County's decade-long total increase of 93,100 people accounted for one-half of the total population growth in the 6-county area. Between 2000 and 2010, population growth (both number of people and percentage increase) was less than the previous decade (1990-2000) in every county, except Clay County.

Based on 2009 data, 2 in 12 county residents has a low income (less than 200% of Federal Poverty Level - FPL), compared to 3 in 11 for the region. Between 2000 and 2009, Johnson County experienced the largest percentage increase of any county in the region of people below 200% FPL with an 88% increase (+42,500 people). Johnson County accounted for 30% of the region's increase in population below 200% FPL. The face of poverty in the county and region is young; in Johnson County more than one-half of those with income at or below 100% FPL are under age 25, yet the age group makes up only one-third of the county's population. In the region and county, the poverty rate for children and youth (0-24) is two times higher than the poverty rate for adults (25 and up). In Johnson County, those under age 25 have a poverty rate of 10.8%, compared to a rate of 5.2% for adults. Region-wide the rates are 17.8% and 8.6%, respectively. Historically, Johnson County has had the lowest poverty rate in the region, now it is second to Platte County (6.2%).

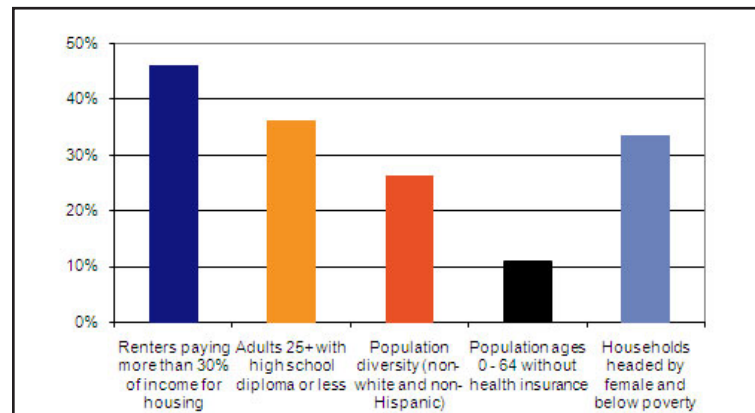
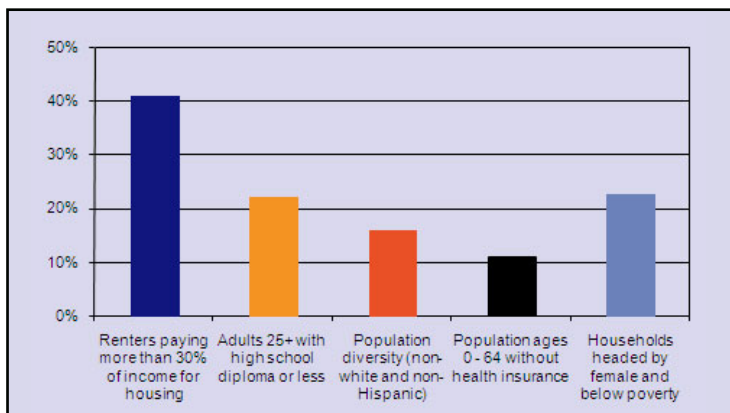

Suburban counties - Johnson, Cass, Clay, Platte - are experiencing the largest percentage increase in Human Need Indicators, while the urban counties - Wyandotte, Jackson - have a greater proportion of their population affected. Compared to 2000, the unemployment rate at the end of 2010 was two to three times higher in every county with the exception of Wyandotte (it was 1/2 times higher). The number of people in Johnson County accessing the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (formerly Food Stamps) increased an average of 318 people each month during 2010. Enrollment went up 21% during 2010, the largest percentage increase in the six counties. Student enrollment in the free and reduced school lunch program went up by 2,400 students, or 14%, between the 2008-09 and 2009-10 school years. Increases in other counties ranged from 5% to 16%. During the 2010-11 school year, participation went up an additional 2,200 students. Now, nearly 1 in 4 Johnson County public school students participate in the program, double the participation rate of a decade ago. 8 five years ago.
